RecSpo 2015: The Recreation & Sports Ministry Conference

August 26-28, 2015 (Spartanburg, SC)

Purpose of the Course

The purpose of this course is to provide quality, supplemental training specifically in the area of recreation and sports ministry.

Core Value Focus

The course will emphasize the seminary's current core value focus assigned annually by the Administrative Council. For 2015-2016 academic year that Core Value is *Missions Focus*.

Doctrinal Integrity – Knowing that the Bible is the Word of God, we believe it, teach it, proclaim it, and submit to it. The doctrinal statements used in our evaluations are our Articles of Religious Belief and the Baptist Faith and Message Statement.

Spiritual Vitality – We are a worshiping community, with both personal spirituality and gathering together as a Seminary for the praise and adoration of God and instruction in His Word.

Mission Focus – We are not here merely to get an education or to give one. We are here to change the world by fulfilling the Great Commission and the Great Commandments through the local church and its ministries.

Characteristic Excellence – What we do, we do to the utmost of our abilities and resources as a testimony to the glory of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

Servant Leadership – We follow the model of Jesus and exert leadership and influence through the nurture and encouragement of those around us.

Curriculum Competencies Addressed

This course will address the following curriculum competencies:

1. *Biblical Exposition*: The student will explore biblical teachings about leadership.
2. *Christian Theological Heritage*: The student will explore biblical, theological and historical background for leadership.

3. *Disciple Making*: The student will learn to apply basic biblical principles in her leadership
4. *Interpersonal Skills*: The student will improve interpersonal communication as well as leadership skills.
5. *Servant Leadership*: The student will understand how to lead others into a clearer knowledge of servant leadership.
6. *Spiritual and Character Formation*: The student will strengthen leadership and ministry skills.
7. *Worship Leadership*: The student will increase skills for teaching and leading others in the church.

Course Description

This course is designed to expose students to current leadership issues in recreation and sports ministry by attending RecSpo15: The Recreation & Sports Ministry Conference. Presentations from outstanding leaders in recreation and sports ministry and missions will provide information that can be applied in the local church and beyond. In addition, students will have the opportunity to network with recreation ministry leaders and learn about available resources for ministering through recreation and sports.

Student Learning Outcomes

The student involved in this course should be able to accomplish the following:

1. Students will understand current trends in recreation and sports ministry.
2. Students will identify leadership principles in recreation and sports ministry.
3. Students will recognize leadership personnel and resources in recreation and sports ministry.
4. Students will apply relevant knowledge and leadership skills in his/her own ministry context.

Course Teaching Methodology

Teaching Methods

1. Lectures and Power Point presentations provided by RecSpo 2015's main speakers and breakout session instructors

3. Small group discussion and networking opportunities
4. Individual study and application

Assignments and Evaluation Criteria

1. Students will enroll in the course with NOBTS as well as registering for the conference with RecSpo 2015. Students are responsible for own transportation, housing, and meals.
2. Students will read the required textbook and submit a one-page, double-spaced report, including statement of what percentage of the book was read. The report also should include significant takeaways for the student as well as an overall impression of the application of the book in recreation and sport ministry.
3. Students will attend all sessions of RecSpo 2015 (including general sessions and classroom sessions) and will meet with course instructor during the conference for debriefing.
4. Students will take notes during all sessions. A typed copy of all conference notes will be due no later than four weeks after the end of the conference. For each classroom session attended, submit a minimum of two ideas, methodologies, or skills that may be applied in recreation and sports ministry. References should be made to the themes found in the textbook reading as applicable. A two-page, double-spaced evaluation of the conference including the benefit to the student's current ministry setting should be included/attached.
5. Students will write an annotated bibliography including ten books on the selected bibliography of this syllabus (other than the required textbook). Each entry of the annotated bibliography should be no less than 2 paragraphs, starting with basic bibliographic information and including a brief summary of the book and its application to recreation and sports ministry. (Using a previously-written synopsis of any book is not acceptable.)

All assignments will be due no later than four weeks after the end of the conference. The report and conference notes can be mailed to Dr. Judi Jackson, NOBTS, 3939 Gentilly Blvd., New Orleans, LA 70126 or emailed to jjackson@nobts.edu as an attached Word document.
