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Seminary Mission Statement

The mission of New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary is to equip leaders to fulfill the Great Commission and the Great Commandments through the local church and its ministries.

Purpose of the Course

The purpose of this course is to provide quality theological education for students in the discipline of theological and historical studies. Lessons learned from the past inform the present and provide guidance for the future.

Core Value Focus, and Curriculum Competencies Addressed

The core value focus of the course will emphasize this semester is **mission focus**. The course will specifically address the following curriculum competencies:

Theological and Historical Heritage – apply theology to everyday life

Disciple Making – develop devotional strategies to model Christ-like behavior

Servant Leadership – use the people from our past to model servant leadership

Spiritual and Character Formation – model Christian character in relating to those in the Baptist family with whom we disagree

Biblical Exposition – demonstrate the biblical foundation of spiritual disciplines

Worship Leadership – examine the variety of prayer styles and practices

Course Description

This course is a pass-fail experience in a faculty led learning context. Students in the course will meet weekly for accountability, mentoring, discussion, and spiritual formation by participating and leading weekly meetings. Students will comprehend a variety of Christian devotional practices by completing specific assignments on basic spiritual disciplines. This course is designed to be taken during a student's first semester. [**See note below.]

**Students registered for DISC5170 will automatically be registered for DISC5171 with the same professor, at the same time, the following semester if DISC 5171 is required for the student's degree plan.

Student Learning Outcomes

In order to provide moral leadership by modeling and mentoring Christian character and devotion and in order to stimulate church health through mobilizing the church for discipleship, the student, by the end of the course, should:

1. Comprehend the following concepts:
 - The marks of a disciple as something beyond the point of salvation.
 - Effective methods of becoming a disciple and of making disciples.
 - The relationship between spiritual maturity and spiritual disciplines.
 - Christian devotional practices or disciplines.
2. Have a positive response to the following concepts:
 - A life-long intentional devotional discipline for lifelong spiritual growth and benefit to the kingdom of God.
 - A meaningful and maturing relationship with God.
 - Christian community in a small group setting.
 - A personal commitment to basic devotional practices.
3. Be able to, with the help of resources, accomplish the following tasks:
 - Develop a plan for personal discipleship and assist others to develop a personal discipleship plan.
 - Practice appropriate disciplines of the Christian faith.
 - Have an appropriate perception as how to lead small discipleship groups.

Responsibilities

- A. Complete reading of the textbook (as required by the professor).
- B. Contribute to discussions.
- C. Lead one of the discussion times.
- D. Help staff the Operation Christmas Child table, November 17, from 1-3 pm
- E. Write a 1-3 page self assessment of your spiritual journey this semester. Include victories and struggles as appropriate. Only the professor will see your assessment. This will be turned in at our final class meeting.

NOTE: Because this is a Pass/Fail course, attendance and participation will be extremely important.

Grading

This experience is a pass/fail course. Grades will be determined by attendance, participation in the session and completion of agreed upon assignments. The final grade decision will be made by the professor. A student missing more than 3 class sessions will fail the course.

Typical Session

Sessions will always include discussion of reading assignments and prayer times. Additional elements may include things like small group worship, accountability questions, and discussion of issues raised in personal journaling.
