Course Description

MUPI5111/5211 Applied Piano for Non-Majors (1 or 2 hours) Faculty

This course is designed for non-music majors and music majors whose major performing area is not piano who desire private study in the area of applied piano. All assignments will be sequenced-based, determined by the needs of the student, and will work to equip the student with piano technique and literature to serve the local church and community.

Student Learning Outcomes

The student is expected to demonstrate weekly progress in his/her level of technical ability, musicianship, score preparation and management, memorization, and presentation. Practice requirements vary but a general expectation is 5 hours weekly for a half hour lesson and 8-10 hours weekly for an hour lesson. Weekly practice goals will be observed through practice passes, which are to be turned in at each lesson. The use of a recording device in lessons is recommended. Additionally, students are expected to memorize and perform present literature being studied for studio recitals, solo recitals (as required by degree program) and jury examinations at the end of the semester. Pieces presented at the jury will reflect the difficulty of the repertoire as required by the course, as well as credit hours. Minimum standard is three pieces reflecting two style periods studied during the course of the semester.

Repertoire Level Examples are as follows: Bach Preludes and Fugues, Suites, Beethoven Sonatas, Chopin Nocturnes Schumann Fantasiestücke; Chopin Impromptu, Polonaises; Brahms Intermezzi, Debussy Preludes, Prokofiev Visions Fugitives; Bartok Six Rumanian Dances

Course Texts

To be determined by the private teacher.

Course Requirements and Grading

Students are expected to attend and will receive one hour lesson weekly. More than two (2) unexcused absences from private lessons will result in the lowering of the final grade, determined by the number of lessons missed. Make-up lessons may be scheduled at the discretion of the teacher if time allows during the semester, provided that a minimum of twenty-four hours notice is given prior to the missed lesson. Lessons missed by the instructor will be rescheduled. Chronic tardiness may also result in a lowering of the final grade. Attendance is also expected at special events featuring the piano department: student and faculty recitals, guest artist recitals and master classes. Students will be expected to perform prepared pieces at a final jury at the end of each semester. The semester grade will be based on the average of the three jury members with the only other consideration being attendance at weekly lessons and the weekly remittance of a practice record.

Course Outline

Students will develop principles of good technique, memory, and performance practices from all four major style periods. The student will also be instructed in advanced worship arrangements at various points. Instruction in piano literature will be determined by the needs of the student with the parameters of the course requirements, with the objective of performing a selection of the literature in jury examination at the end of the semester. In addition, the student will be expected to progress in the areas of functional keyboard skills such as sight reading, improvisation, and accompanying.
