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Mission Statement

The mission of New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary is to equip leaders to fulfill the Great Commission and the Great Commandments through the local church and its ministries.

Core Value Focus

The seminary has five core values.

1. **Doctrinal Integrity:** Knowing that the Bible is the Word of God, we believe it, teach it, proclaim it, and submit to it. This course addresses Doctrinal Integrity specifically by preparing students to grow in understanding and interpreting of the Bible.
2. **Spiritual Vitality:** We are a worshiping community emphasizing both personal spirituality and gathering together as a Seminary family for the praise and adoration of God and instruction in His Word. Spiritual Vitality is addressed by reminding students that a dynamic relationship with God is vital for effective ministry.
3. **Mission Focus:** We are not here merely to get an education or to give one. We are here to change the world by fulfilling the Great Commission and the Great Commandments through the local church and its ministries. This course addresses Mission Focus by helping students understand the biblical foundations for fulfilling the Great Commission and the Great Commandments.
4. **Characteristic Excellence:** What we do, we do to the utmost of our abilities and resources as a testimony to the glory of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Characteristic Excellence is addressed by preparing students to excel in their ability to interpret Scripture, which is foundational to effective ministry.
5. **Servant Leadership:** We follow the model of Jesus and exert leadership and influence through the nurture and encouragement of those around us. Servant Leadership is modeled by classroom deportment.

The core value focus for this academic year is Doctrinal Integrity.

Curriculum Competencies

NOBTS faculty members realize that all ministers need to develop specific competencies if they are going to have an effective ministry. To increase the likelihood of NOBTS graduates having

an effective ministry, the faculty developed a competency-based curriculum after identifying seven essential competencies necessary for effective ministry. All graduates are expected to have at least a minimum level of competency in all of the following areas:

1. **Biblical Exposition:** to interpret and communicate the Bible accurately.
2. **Christian Theological Heritage:** To understand and interpret Christian theological heritage and Baptist polity for the church.
3. **Disciple Making:** To stimulate church health through mobilizing the church for missions, evangelism, discipleship, and church growth.
4. **Interpersonal Skills:** To perform pastoral care effectively, with skills in communication and conflict management.
5. **Servant Leadership:** To serve churches effectively through team ministry.
6. **Spiritual and Character Formation:** To provide moral leadership by modeling and mentoring Christian character and devotion.
7. **Worship Leadership:** To facilitate worship effectively.

The curriculum competencies addressed in this course are: Disciple Making, Servant Leadership, and Spiritual and Character Formation.

Course Description

This course involves a survey of a wide selection of churches, church-type missions, and missions centers in New Orleans. Attention is also given to various communities within the New Orleans metropolitan area. Specific notice will be taken of post-Katrina recovery efforts in the Christian community. Students will be exposed to individuals with varied and extensive ministry experience in New Orleans. Many sites are visited during the course, and students are given some actual mission experiences in the city.

Student Learning Outcomes

1. That students will come to have a greater appreciation of and familiarity with the New Orleans metropolitan area, especially in light of the flooding caused by hurricane Katrina.
2. That students will become familiar with varied types of ministry, mission, relief, and recovery activities being carried on in New Orleans.
3. That students will gain firsthand experience in at least one kind of mission work being carried on in New Orleans.
4. That students will leave the class more prepared for life and ministry in New Orleans, or for life and ministry in other urban settings.
5. That students will become knowledgeable with the work of Southern Baptists in New Orleans.
6. That students will become familiar with various strategies being used in New Orleans to minister to needs and to grow churches.
7. That students will become motivated to be involved in ministry and mission while they are in New Orleans.

Course Teaching Methodology

A variety of teaching methods will be utilized such as class presentations by the professor using PowerPoint and handouts. Other teaching methods include small and large group discussion, multi-media presentations, utilization of missions related websites, and other communication mediums. However, the majority of class time will be spent in visiting sites in and around New Orleans to find out about ministry, missions, relief, and recovery.

Textbook

Course Requirements

1. Read the textbook and do a book review of 4 to 6 pages. The book review is due at the beginning of class on Oct. 8. The review should be in Turabian format and should include something on the author, a summary of the contents, your analysis of the book, and interaction with the book in light of your interaction with New Orleans.

2. City Projects—Do EITHER I , or II. Also do III

Choose I or II:

- I. Attend a worship service in English of a Baptist church made up primarily of attendees from a culture of origin other than yours. Discuss your experience in three or four paragraphs on the appropriate discussion board on the class Blackboard site by Nov. 12.
- II. Attend a worship service of a Baptist church NOT IN your heart language. Discuss your experience in three or four paragraphs on the appropriate discussion board on the class Blackboard site by Nov. 12.
- III. Spend five hours in volunteer service in or around New Orleans during this semester (in addition to any hours spent in volunteer service during one of our Monday classes). This may be satisfied by serving in disaster relief during the semester. Discuss this experience (including our class time spent in volunteer service) on the appropriate Blackboard Discussion Board. The discussion should be approximately four paragraphs long. This discussion is due by Nov. 12.

3. Write a reflection paper of at least 5 pages in which you summarize what you have learned during the class, and in which you indicate what you think are the most important factors for effective ministry and missions in New Orleans. Include reflections on rebuilding and recovery efforts. Also include brief summaries of each site visited. The reflection paper is due on Dec. 7. **Submit this assignment to the appropriate Blackboard** assignment site.

Assignments due on a day the class meets are due at the beginning of class. Any late assignment will be penalized 10 points for the any part of the first day late and 5 points per weekday thereafter. **ALL ASSIGNMENTS MUST BE COMPLETED IN ORDER TO PASS THE COURSE.**
