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Mission Statement

New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary and Leavell College prepare servants to walk with Christ, proclaim His truth, and fulfill His mission.

Course Description

This course is designed to explore vocational calling and leadership opportunities for women in ministry. Students will examine practical as well as biblical and theological matters regarding ministry preparation and development of leadership skills, particularly as they relate to women in ministry leadership.

Student Learning Outcomes

1. Explore biblical and theological foundations of vocational ministry for women.
2. Examine different skills specific to women of leading and relating to others.
3. Understand the unique challenges of women in vocational and volunteer ministry.
4. Evaluate personal ministry calling and leadership skills.

Course Teaching Methodology

The course will involve the following methodologies: textbook reading, slideshow presentations, discussion board, and interactive discovery-learning.

Course Requirements

1. **Reading Contract/Class Participation.** The student is expected to complete the ongoing reading assignments in preparation for each class day, and then submit a signed statement at the end of the course, indicating what percentage of the textbooks you have read. **Due: December 2, 2021**

On Campus Class Participation:

Classroom participation is determined by attendance, completion of all reading assignments prior to the scheduled class time, and active participation in classroom discussions and activities.

Flex Participation:

If you are taking this course as a NOLA2U Flex student, please note the following attendance policies:

1. You are required to be in class either through viewing the lectures live or viewing the recorded lectures on Blackboard. When you view the recorded lecture, you will be considered present for that class. Regardless of if you watch the class live or recorded, you are only allowed to miss the amount of class time specified in the NOBTS attendance policy as stated in the graduate catalog. 2. You will be asked to certify that you have been present for the live session or have viewed the recorded session. This certification will be done through Dr. Emily Dean after having watched the class live or viewing the recorded session.

3. All video lectures are available for 7 days after the video is posted. If you are unable to view the video within that time frame, you will be considered absent for that class session.

4. Technical issues will not be considered a valid reason for missing a lecture.

2. Annotated Bibliography. The student will develop an annotated bibliography of at least 10 works on subjects related to women in ministry leadership. The document should be typed using Turabian format and should include the bibliographical information for each item along with a 3-4 sentence description of the work.

Due: September 21, 2021

3. Leader Profile. The student will research one woman leader in ministry past or current (can be a paid staff or volunteer layperson, parachurch leader, or seminary professor). Submit a newsletter style summary of the research findings about the leader. Creativity is encouraged. Information should include: (1) biographical information, type of ministry, place of service, etc.; (2) the leader's call to ministry and philosophy of ministry; (3) unique challenges encountered in leadership; (4) ways this leader develops leaders within her ministry; and (5) the 'take-away' or highlight of the research. The student will present the findings to the class in a 3-5 minute presentation. Flex students may present live or submit a video recording of their presentation. Current Turabian guidelines for title page and format are to be followed, **due October 19, 2021**

5. Leadership Principle Presentation. The student will develop a presentation on one leadership principle derived from research and class discussions. The presentation should include application specific to women serving in ministry leadership. Students will present their findings to the class in a 5-10 minute presentation. Flex students may present live or submit a video recording of their presentation. **Due: November 16, 2021**

4. Ministry Philosophy Paper. The student will research practical, biblical, and theological considerations for women in ministry leadership in order to develop a personal philosophy of ministry. Included in the philosophy should be biblical foundations for women in leadership, leadership issues specific to women, unique challenges for women in vocational or volunteer ministry, personal evaluation of ministry calling and leadership style, and 4-5 goals for future development as a leader. The paper should include 8-10 pages of content and be typed, double spaced following Turabian guidelines. **Due: December 2, 2021**

Evaluation of Grade

The student's grade will be computed as follows:
