The mission of New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary is to equip leaders to fulfill the Great Commission and the Great Commandments through the local church.

Purpose of the Course

Children and the Christian Faith is designed to equip students to help each child experience and respond to God at his/her own level of development.

Core Value Focus

Doctrinal Integrity – Knowing that the Bible is the Word of God, we believe it, teach it, proclaim it, and submit to it. The doctrinal statements used in our evaluations are our Articles of Religious Belief and the Baptist Faith and Message Statement.

Spiritual Vitality – We are a worshipping community, with both personal spirituality and gathering together as a Seminary for the praise and adoration of God and instruction in His Word.

Mission Focus – We are not here merely to get an education or to give one. We are here to change the world by fulfilling the Great Commission and the Great Commandments through the local church and its ministries.

Characteristic Excellence – What we do, we do to the utmost of our abilities and resources as a testimony to the glory of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

Servant Leadership – We follow the model of Jesus and exert leadership and influence through the nurture and encouragement of those around us.

Annually, the President will designate a core value that will become the focus of pedagogy for the year. For 2014-2015 academic year that Core Value is *Spiritual Vitality*. The course will emphasize the seminary's current core value focus of *Spiritual Vitality*.

Curriculum Competencies Addressed

New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary curriculum is guided by seven basic competencies: biblical exposition, Christian theological heritage, disciple making, interpersonal skills, servant leadership, spiritual and character formation, and worship leadership.

This course seeks to develop the following competency:

Disciple-making: Students will understand and facilitate the spiritual formation of children.

Course Description

In this course the student is exposed to approaches for developing ministries for children which will better equip the child to experience and respond to God at his own level of understanding. Worship, conversion, church membership, baptism, the Lord's Supper, prayer, and the Bible are the primary content areas.

Learning Objectives

At the conclusion of the course you should be able to:

1. Identify and evaluate strategies that will facilitate the spiritual formation of children.
2. Appreciate the significance of family and cultural influences on children's spiritual formation.
3. Facilitate a child's spiritual formation from a sound theological and developmental perspective.

Teaching Method. This class will include group discussions, field experiences, and student projects. This course will be delivered on the main campus in a block format.

Assignments and Evaluation Criteria

1. **Exegetical Paper on the Shema (15%)** **Due: February 10**
You will write a 4 to 5-page exegetical paper on the *Shema* (Deut. 6:1-9) following *Guidelines for an Exegetical Paper* posted on Blackboard under Paper Writing Resources. A minimum of three academic resources, at least two of which are commentaries, are to be used. *This assignment is related to SLO #2. A rubric for this assignment may be found on Blackboard in Assignment Upload.*

2. **Reading Log (30%)** **Due: March 3/April 14**
You will submit a log of completed weekly readings as outlined in the course schedule. Reading logs should also contain one to two reflective paragraphs regarding the weekly reading assignments. Reflections can be written in first person. Reading logs will be submitted to Blackboard on Weeks 7 and 14. A *Reading Log Template* is provided in the Assignment Upload for this assignment on Blackboard. *This assignment is related to SLO #2. A rubric for this assignment may be found on Blackboard in Assignment Upload.*

3. **Book Talk/Assessment (10%)** **Due: March 17**
You will:
 - (1) select a text from the *Book List* section of the course's Blackboard and submit the title to the professor in week 2 for approval (this is to avoid duplication). You will complete a 2 to 3-page assessment of the text which addresses its theological and doctrinal integrity, usefulness in ministry with children and families, and application within your ministry context and personal life. This may be written in first person. *This assignment is related to SLO #3. A rubric for this assignment may be found on Blackboard in Assignment Upload.*

 - (2) create a 1-page handout including an annotated bibliography which highlights the strengths of the text and its applicability to ministry. This handout is to be distributed in class on the assigned date and posted on Blackboard Discussion Board for classmates to review.

 - (3) conduct a 3-5 minute creative presentation about your selected text on the assigned date.

4. **Spiritual Disciplines Group Presentation (10%)** **Due: March 10**
You will be placed in a small group to present a spiritual discipline (i.e., service, prayer, family worship, Scripture memory, Bible study, silence and solitude, and evangelism) and how children and families may engage in the practice of the discipline. Your presentations should be creative and address various learning styles. The presentations will be posted to the assigned Discussion Board on the due date. Group size will be determined by class size. *This assignment is related to SLO #1. A rubric for this assignment may be found on Blackboard in Assignment Upload.*
5. **Media Evaluation and Reflection (15%)** **Due: April 7**
You will:
(1) Attend one movie (rated G or PG-13) currently in theatres or released within the last 2 years and evaluate its worldview using the *Let's Go to the Movies* handout provided by the professor and located in this course on Blackboard.

(2) Visit a major bookstore (not online) and review current literature, music, and electronic games for children. Consider the physical environment (i.e., What do children see as they approach the children's section and once they arrive there), and the worldview promoted through the materials.

(3) Write a 2-3 page summary of your findings and their possible implications for the spiritual formation of children. Submit the summary to Blackboard on the assigned date. *This assignment is related to SLO #2. A rubric for this assignment may be found on Blackboard in Assignment Upload.*
6. **Spiritual Formation Plan (10%)** **Due: April 28**
You will develop a one-year plan for a local church to shepherd children birth – twelve, and parents in spiritual formation. You should include in the plan the church programs offered (e.g. Sunday School) as well as additional opportunities (e.g. mission trip, camp) that will impact spiritual formation. A rationale for each component of the plan should be given. Submit the plan to Blackboard on the assigned date. *This assignment is related to SLOs #1 and #3. A rubric for this assignment may be found on Blackboard in Assignment Upload.*
7. **Participation (10%)**
You are expected to participate fully through class discussion, presentations, and class activities. This portion of the course grade will be evaluated by the professor with regard to meaningful participation, assignment completion, the timely submission of assignments, and evidence of engagement with course materials. You begin with 100.

Course Policies

Classroom Decorum: Your participation is required for every class session. You are expected to:

Copying another person's work, submitting downloaded material without proper references, submitting material without properly citing the source, submitting the same material for credit in more than one course, and other such forms of dishonesty are strictly forbidden. *Although anything cited in three sources is considered public domain, we require that all sources be cited.* Any infraction will result in failing the course. Any infraction will be reported to the Dean of Students for further action.

Revision of the Syllabus: The course syllabus is not a legal contract. Any syllabus revision will be preceded by a reasonable notice to students. The standards and requirements set forth in this syllabus may be modified at any time by the professor. Notice of such changes will be by announcement in class or by email notice.

Professor's Absence or Tardiness: If the professor is late in arriving to class, you must wait a full 20 minutes after the start of class before you may leave without being counted absent, or you must follow any written instructions that may be given to you.

Grading Scale: Your final grade will be based on your total accumulation of points as indicated under the *Assignments and Evaluation Criteria* section of this syllabus according to the grading scale in the NOBTS 2013-2014 catalog.

Assignment Submission: All assignments are to be submitted to Blackboard by 11:59 p.m. of the due date unless otherwise indicated. Do not send files as attachments via email to the professor. For technical reasons, this mode of file transmission is extremely inefficient.

Assignment Formatting: Unless otherwise noted, all assignments are to be created in Turabian format. All written assignments must be Word documents, written in third person unless otherwise instructed, and created in 12 pt. Times New Roman font. PDFs will not be accepted.

Late Assignments: Only under extreme circumstances, and with prior approval, will a late assignment be accepted. Late assignments will be assessed an initial 10 percent penalty and 1 percent for each day after the due date (i.e. 10/1 points for a 100 point assignment, 3/.3 points for a 30 point assignment). No assignments will be accepted more than two weeks after the original due date. Missed presentations may not be made up.

Electronic Devices: Electronic devices may be used in class only for taking notes and other activities assigned by the professor. Other activities are strictly prohibited. Laptops may not be open during presentations unless requested by the presenter. Phones must be silenced during class time. Any student found violating this policy may be asked to leave class and will be counted absent.

Recording Policy: Recordings of class, including any audio and/or video recordings, regardless of the media or format, and regardless of the intended or actual use, are not permitted without prior written permission of the professor. The class will be notified in advance should any such recording be approved. This policy is intended to protect the privacy of the students.
