Mission Statement

The mission of New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary is to equip leaders to fulfill the Great Commission and the Great Commandments through the local church and its ministries.

Course Purpose, Core Value Focus, and Curriculum Competencies Addressed

The purpose of this course is to carry out the mission of NOBTS as is reflected through the core values and the core competencies in the following ways:

Core Values

The core value emphasis this year is Mission Focus

1. Doctrinal Integrity- The course will follow the confessional commitments that are outlined in the Articles of Religious Belief and the Baptist Faith and Message 2000
2. Spiritual Vitality- The professor will teach that missions without spiritual vitality is ineffective for the Kingdom of God.
3. Mission focus- The core of this course related to the mission focus of the seminary. This is the core value focus for the 2015-16 academic year.
4. Characteristic Excellence- The professor will teach that missions is a service to Christ and therefore should be rendered with characteristic excellence.
5. Servant Leadership- The professor will teach that servant leadership is a crucial aspect of those involved in missions

Core Competencies- The class will address six of the seven competencies:

1. Biblical Exposition- The biblical foundations of missions will be examined..
2. Christian Theological Heritage- The history of Christian missions will be examined.
3. Disciple Making- Disciple making in a mission context will be explored..
4. Interpersonal Skills- Students will be challenged to see the vital connection between interpersonal skills and missions.
5. Servant Leadership- The servant leadership nature of missions will be explored..
6. Spiritual and Character Formation-Students will be exposed, through reading and contact, with those who model Christian character and devotion in mission settings.

Course Description

In this course students are introduced to Christian missions through a brief examination of biblical and theological foundations and a historical overview. Attention is given to the International and North American Mission Boards of the Southern Baptist Convention, including their administration and programs. Particular attention is given to strategic concerns affecting the future of the mission enterprise.

Student Learning Outcomes

In order to help fulfill the Great Commission, the students, by the end of the course, should:

1. Be able to apply their knowledge and comprehension of the biblical, theological, historical, and cultural foundations of Christian Missions to the process of mobilizing the church for missions.
2. Develop a church missions strategy based on partnership with SBC missions organizations.
3. Value strategic concerns affecting the future of missions.
4. Be able to accomplish the following:
 - a) Participate in a volunteer missions experience.
 - b) Advocate missions among Southern Baptists.

Course Teaching Methodology

A variety of teaching methods will be utilized such as online presentations by the professor, PowerPoint presentations, readings, and online handouts. There will be frequent brief audio lectures. Students will spend time with online mission resources. Other teaching methods include discussions on Blackboard forums and successful completion of online quizzes.

Course Requirements

1. Once each student has completed the registration procedures and had cleared the business office, he or she will be automatically enrolled in the Blackboard portion of the course. The class will begin on Monday, May 30. The first thing each student should do is go through “Unit 1: Getting Started”. This will explain course procedures.

2. Students should proceed through the learning units in numerical order beginning with “Unit 1: Getting Started.” New units will be released several at a time so students should not expect to work ahead too far. Units will be due mainly on each Wednesday and each Saturday. All units must be completed along with required readings. At the end of each section of a unit students will indicate completion of that section of the unit by clicking on the “Reviewed” button. **PLEASE DO NOT FORGET TO MARK AS REVIEWED AS YOU GOT THROUGH THE DIFFERENT PARTS OF EACH UNIT.** Orderly completion of the weekly Units along with attention to the specific assignments given in this syllabus will keep the student on track for successful completion of the course. The deadline for completing a unit is midnight on the date it is due. Unit 1 is due at 11:59 PM on Wednesday, June 1. Most units will contain quizzes. Quizzes **CANNOT** be taken late. If you miss a quiz you will not get credit for that quiz. The two lowest quiz grades will be dropped. Quizzes can be taken **at least twice** and you can access any materials in completing the quizzes. They are “open book” quizzes. A second attempt on a quiz **CANNOT** add more than 50 points to your quiz score, so students should attempt to answer all questions on the first attempt. For example, if you make 40 on the first attempt, even if you get all answers correct on the second attempt, your score on the second attempt would be 90.

3. Reading, review, and completion of unit materials. Mark each item as reviewed when you have completed it. A quiz may be given on any materials in the unit, including textbook reading.

4. Outside Projects (Assignments not found in Blackboard Units but to be submitted on Blackboard as noted below):

a. **Reflection Discussion.** Write an eight to ten paragraph discussion on how you sense God’s leadership to be involved in missions. Describe how you have examined the missionary call to determine whether or not God has or is calling you to service as a long-term missionary at this point in time. Include how you will be available for possible short term missionary service in your ministry if not called to long-term missionary service. Discuss further aspects of how you will be involved in missions. Chapter 38 of the textbook provides helpful insights for exploring a missionary call in one’s life and should be consulted for this discussion. The discussion should include appropriate references to Bible verses and other sources as needed. It may be written using first person. The discussion will be graded for clarity, content, creative expression, and proper grammatical expression and form. This assignment is due to be submitted via the Blackboard Discussion Forum by July 9.

b. **Acts 1:8 Plan.** Develop a plan for enlisting your church as an Acts 1:8 Church. Make sure that you have adequately addressed each of the requirements for a church to become an Acts 1:8 Church. If your church is already an Acts 1:8 Church develop your plan for another church. The plan is due on July 6 and is to be submitted via the assignment folder for this project. Helps for the Acts 1:8 Plan can be found on the External Links site.

NOTE: This assignment is an embedded assignment that will be completed by all students for all sections of this course. The rubric for grading this assignment is attached to this syllabus. Please complete the assignment according to this rubric and the syllabus.

c. **Volunteer service.** Spend 4 hours in volunteer mission work. Report on the experience in the Blackboard Discussion Board. Clear the volunteer experience with the professor before you commit to the volunteer placement. The volunteer work must be completed by July 12 and the

discussion entered in Blackboard by July 13.

d. Missionary Biography. After reading your missionary biography (from a list supplied by the instructor) post a discussion of the missionary to this discussion board. Your discussion should be 5 to 6 substantial paragraphs in which you discuss the missionary and the ministry of that missionary. Evaluate the life and work of the missionary and point out major contributions. After posting your discussion read and respond to at least 14 other posts. The post on your missionary biography should be entered by June 25 and your responses to 8 other posts should be completed by June 27.

e. Project. Do **one of** the following projects:

1. Choice One: Research Project- Develop a people profile for an unreached people group (to be selected in consultation with the professor) OR write a research paper on a topic approved by the professor.

By June 10 each student will submit the topic of the project in the appropriate discussion forum. By June 15 each student will turn in a preliminary outline of his or her project with at least 6 of the 12 sources that will be used. This will be submitted in the Assignments folder. By June 22 a detailed outline with at least 10 sources should be submitted in the Assignments folder. A rough draft of the project (with at least 8 pages of text-excluding the works cited page should be submitted in the Assignments folder by July 16. The final project is due on Monday, July 18 and should be submitted on the appropriate discussion board so that all students will have access to papers. The paper should also be submitted in the assignment folder. The paper should be at least 10 pages in length (the text portion) and use at least 12 sources. All papers should be in Turabian format. Use footnotes to show your sources. Students will also be responsible for reviewing and commenting on 5 other research papers (or the total number of research projects submitted, whichever number is smaller). Failure to review the research papers of fellow students will negatively impact your research paper grade. The review discussions should be in the discussion forum where the paper being reviewed was posted. Review discussions should be posted by Tuesday, July 19.

2. Choice Two: *Any Three* Witnessing Assignment

Read the book, *Any 3: Anyone, Anywhere, Anytime* by Mike Shipman. Enter a six to eight paragraph discussion of the book in the appropriate discussion forum by June 29. Memorize the *Any Three* presentation and practice it with at least two people (these can be Christians) and enter a one paragraph discussion of your two practice attempts in the appropriate discussion forum by July 1. No later than July 15 go through substantially all of the *Any Three* presentation with at least two Muslims. Enter a three of four paragraph discussion of your witness attempts in the appropriate discussion forum by July 15.
