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Mission Statement

New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary Leavell College prepare servants to walk with Christ, proclaim His truth, and fulfill His mission.

Course Purpose, Core Value Focus, and Curriculum Competencies Addressed

The purpose of this course is to carry out the mission of NOBTS as is reflected through the core values and the core competencies in the following ways:

Core Values

1. Doctrinal Integrity- The course will follow the confessional commitments that are outlined in the Articles of Religious Belief and the Baptist Faith and Message 2000
2. Spiritual Vitality- The professor will teach that ministry and missions without spiritual vitality is ineffective for the Kingdom of God.
3. Mission focus- The course will deal with missions to a wide variety of people.
4. Characteristic Excellence- The professor will teach that missions and ministry is a service to Christ and therefore should be rendered with characteristic excellence.
5. Servant Leadership- The professor will teach that servant leadership is a crucial aspect of those involved in missions

The Core Value emphasis for the current year is Spiritual Vitality.

Core Competencies

The seminar will address three of the seven competencies.

1. Disciple Making- Students will examine ways people and ministries are making disciples in the context in which are found refugees, immigrants, and internationals.
2. Servant Leadership- Students will examine leadership styles effective ministry and missions.
3. Spiritual and Character Formation- Students will be exposed, through reading and contact, with those who model Christian character and devotion in ministry to refugees, immigrants, and internationals.

Course Description

This course involves a survey of the issues around the world of refugees and how the church can minister to them on their journey and upon arrival in their new homes. Issues related to migration and how immigrants can be reached for Christ will also be examined. An examination will also be made of internationals, especially students, who live around us and how we can be more effective in ministering to them.

Student Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

1. Identify and describe the issues and problems faced by refugees, immigrants, and internationals.
2. Understand and design effective ministries to refugees, immigrants, and internationals.
3. Value the place that refugees, immigrants, and internationals play in our society and the role churches and ministries have in ministering the love of Christ to these individuals.
4. Apply principals of ministry to refugees, immigrants, and internationals in ways that will lead churches and other ministries to effective ministry.

Course Teaching Methodology

A variety of teaching methods will be utilized such as class presentations by the professor using PowerPoint and handouts. Other teaching methods include small and large group discussion, multi-media presentations, utilization of missions related web sites, and other communication mediums. Students will be exposed to individuals in the target group and will learn from that interaction.

Class Assignments

1. Read the textbooks as assigned. Be prepared to show comprehension of the texts through class discussions and through reading quizzes. Also read other assigned reading given during the semester.
2. Choose one book from a list given by the instructor to read and review. An oral presentation will be made in class and a 4-6 doubled-spaced pages book review will be submitted on . The

first is due on Feb. 19 and a three page double-spaced summary of the book is due on March 30.

3. Ministry Study. Visit and study a church or ministry ministering to refugees, immigrants, or internationals. Submit a 2-3 page summary of that ministry and be prepared to share the results of your study in class. Due on Apr. 20.

4. Volunteer Experience. Spend four hours in volunteer service at a church or ministry doing ministry to refugees, migrants, or internationals. As much as possible the hours should be spend working with one or more of these groups. Discuss this experience in the appropriate Blackboard Discussion Forum. The discussion should be approximately four paragraphs long. Due on Apr. 13.

5. Group Project. Locate and interview at least six individuals. Find at least two interviewees for each of the categories of refugee, immigrant, and international. Ask the individuals about issues related to how they came to their current country, what were the conditions in their previous homeland, what were their experiences in moving to their current home, what were their greatest needs when resettling, how they relate to others from their homeland, how they relate to the people and culture of their new home, and what their future plans are as to resettlement. Include several other topics in your interview. Present a two page summary of each interview and be prepared to share a report of your interviews in class. Based on your interviews submit an additional 4-5 page implications paper discussing lessons learned, questions raised, and opportunities for ministry to individuals in these groups. Seek to get permission for one or more of the interviewees to be videoed. Show relevant parts of the interviews in class. Bonus: For extra points get information from a refugee still in a refugee camp, or having just left a refugee camp within the past 6 months, and include in report. Due on May 4.
