Mission Statement of the Counseling Program

The mission of the NOBTS Counseling Program is to provide training and supervised experience in evidence-based counseling methods to help people deal with life issues in a biblically sound way and prepare students for licensure in counseling and counseling-related professions. We seek to produce graduates who have the values, knowledge, skills, and personal disposition to promote the mental health and holistic wellness of clients across diverse populations.

Course Description

Recognizing the need for personal integration of the Bible into the counselor’s own life, this course is designed to examine and express the connections between humans and God as defined in Scripture. Models of integrating Scripture and counseling are presented. Students are challenged to learn effective, therapeutic methods of sharing Biblical passages, principles, theology, and historical contexts with counselees. God’s word is presented as the truth, which permeates the presence of the Christian counseling environment.

Woven <p>For each book, students will indicate the percentage of the book read and complete a QQTP.</p> <p>QQTP - Questions, Quotations & Talking Points: The following will need to be uploaded to Canvas prior to class on the due date.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Questions: Note the points at which a question comes to mind as you read each assigned texts. Write thoughtful questions that invite analysis, synthesis, or evaluation of the material, or makes connections between the readings and class material. • Quotation: Select 3-5 quotations that are especially pertinent or relevant to the main points of the text. The quotations should be neither too short (1-2 lines), nor too long (10-12 lines). Cite the page number. • Talking Points. Write talking points that show that you have thought seriously and critically about the reading. These may be in the form of a statement or a question. If a question, you do not need to answer your question in writing, but you should talk about it in class. <p>3. Memorization of Philippians Memorization of the book of Philippians is a major project in this course. A portion of each class period will be dedicated to examining the text and working on memorizing this book of the Bible. By the end of the semester the student will be expected to be able to quote the entire book of Philippians. <p>Disciplines of Memorization of Philippians:</p> <p>The book of Philippians is only four chapters long. However, memorizing the entire book will require a new level of discipline and intentional practice. While it may seem daunting, we are in this together and will all be working daily to commit this book to memory.</p> <p>A. Daily Practice Log Each week we will complete the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Read/ or listen to the entire book of Philippians 4 of 7 days. (4x / week) - Write (by hand) the assigned verses for the week (1x / week) - Reflect – ask God to speak to you through the verses you are memorizing each week. Journal reflections from this time – what you are learning and how you are applying (2x weekly minimum) - Repeat daily the assigned verses for the week out loud (7x / week) - Review verses for the week throughout the day every day (7 days) - Recite all the verses assigned up to that point - ideally to another person who can check you (2x / week – once in class each week and one other time) 	<p>20%</p>	<p>2/6 3/7 4/4 5/2</p>
