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Mission Statement

New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary and Leavell College prepare servants to walk with Christ, proclaim His truth, and fulfill His mission.

Course Description

This course gives concentrated attention to the great evangelistic stories, commands, and themes of the New Testament. The evangelistic activities of Jesus, Paul, the early church, and other individuals will be studied in light of their historical and modern implications.

Student Learning Outcomes

1. Students will understand the priority and practice of evangelism according to principles outlined in Scripture.
2. Students will identify the current theological issues which affect their concept and strategy of evangelism in the local church.
3. Students will evaluate contemporary evangelistic practices in light of biblical and theological principles of evangelism.
4. Students will value biblical and theological principles of evangelism as integral to the success of the disciple-making mission of the church.

Course Teaching Methodology

The course will feature a variety of teaching methods including class lectures and discussions, periodic evaluation over course reading material, small group activities and accountability, and the personal involvement of students in evangelism and Scripture memory.

Course Requirements

1. TEXTBOOKS. Students will complete assigned readings of the textbooks according to the course requirements and schedule in the syllabus.
2. QUIZZES. A quiz may be given at any class session on recent class lectures or the assigned readings for the day. **Under no circumstances will any quiz ever be given in advance or as a make-up.** At the end of the semester, students may drop at least one quiz grade.
3. SCRIPTURE MEMORY. Students will memorize assigned passages of Scripture relating to biblical principles and practices of evangelism and be able to recite those passages verbally and in written form.
4. DISCIPLE-MAKING WORKSHEET. Students will complete a “Disciple-Making Worksheet” (7-10 pages) that examines the principles and practices of evangelism in the life and ministry of Christ. An outline for the worksheet will be provided for the student at the beginning of the semester. The worksheet should incorporate insights gleaned from class lectures and discussions, Gospel texts, and Coleman’s book *The Master Plan of Evangelism*. Matters of form and style should conform to the latest edition of Turabian. **Due: March 9.**
5. EVANGELISM REFLECTIONS. Students will prepare four reflections of witnessing experiences which occur during the semester. The guide for these reflections is attached to the syllabus. **Due: 2 Reflections due March 9; 2 Reflections due at Final Exam on May 9.**
6. MIDTERM EXAM. Students will complete a midterm exam over principles and practices covered in class lectures and discussions. **Due: March 30.**
7. RESEARCH PAPER AND FINAL EXAM. Students will complete a major research paper (15-25 typed, double-spaced pages) on a subject assigned in conjunction with the Instructor. For the student’s Final Exam, he/she will prepare an oral presentation of the paper’s findings for class discussion. The oral presentation should include quotation of a passage of Scripture (at least five verses in length) that pertains to the subject matter of the student’s paper. Matters of form and style in the paper should conform to the latest edition of Turabian. **Due: TBA.**

If you are taking this course as a NOLA2U Flex student, please note the following attendance policies:

1. You are required to be in class either through viewing the lectures live or viewing the recorded lectures on Canvas. When you view the recorded lecture, you will be considered present for that class. Regardless of if you watch the class live or recorded, you are only allowed to miss the amount of class time specified in the NOBTS attendance policy as stated in this syllabus.

2. You will be asked to certify that you have been present for the live session or have viewed the recorded session. This certification will be done through sending the professor a message through Canvas or an email containing the key word, phrase, or sentence embedded in the lecture after having watched the class live or viewing the recorded session.

Note: A student must complete ALL of the above assignments in order to pass the class.

Students are expected to attend and participate in the class sessions. Any student missing more than nine hours may receive an automatic grade of "F" for the course. Three tardies will count as one absence.
