



ThM Graduation Application Deadline



Students who have passed the Qualifying Exam and completed 37 semester hours of PhD work are eligible to receive the ThM degree. The deadline to apply to graduate in May with the ThM degree alone is **February 15**. Participation in the graduation ceremony is optional.

To apply, you must come to the ReDOC office (not the Registrar's Office) to do the following:

- Complete a graduation application form

- Complete a ThM Graduation Application listing the 37 hours of PhD work that will comprise your ThM degree (both forms can be located under "Program Materials" on our webpage,)
- Pay the \$55 diploma fee

In addition, you will be required to pay off all account balances and library fines as you would for any graduation. However, you will not be required to return outstanding library books before the due dates indicated. Students participating in graduation should see William at the LifeWay campus bookstore to order a cap and gown.

Students graduating with both the ThM and PhD degrees can submit the graduation applications with the dissertation materials on March 1 (see below).

Lynn E. May, Jr. Study Grants

The Southern Baptist Historical Library and Archives sponsors a program whereby funds are made available for partial support of research in the Southern Baptist Historical Library and Archives. The grants provide a maximum of \$750 per award. Annually, over \$5,000 in grants are awarded to researchers. The grants are in memory of Lynn E. May, Jr., who served as Executive Director of the Historical Commission from 1971 to 1995 and who was instrumental in the establishment of the Southern Baptist Library and Archives. The deadline for grants for this year is **April 1, 2010**. Applicants will be notified before the end of April about the awards.

Research funds are available for support to those doing research in the field of Baptist history using the resources in the Southern Baptist Historical Library and Archives. Graduate students, college and seminary professors, historians, and other writers may apply. The grants provided to assist in travel and research costs.
