Course Purpose, Core Value Focus, and Curriculum Competencies Addressed

- Course Purpose: The purpose of this seminar is to engage in scholarly research and discussion concerning the nature of evangelistic preaching.
- Core Value Focus: Mission Focus – We are not here merely to get an education or to give one. We are here to change the world by fulfilling the Great Commission and the Great Commandments through the local church and its ministries (online *Graduate Catalog, 2010-2011, p. 4*).
- Curriculum Competencies Addressed: Disciple Making Competency

Course Description

This seminar is a study of the factors involved in evangelistic preaching. An investigation of various approaches to evangelistic preaching, past and present, will be included in the study (online *Graduate Catalog, 2010-2011, p. 130*).

Objectives

1. Students will understand basic theological and practical elements involved in evangelistic preaching.
2. Students will become familiar with principles of communication and persuasion as they relate to evangelistic preaching.
3. Students will examine various biblical, practical, theological, and ethical components of evangelistic preaching.
4. Students will analyze the approach of significant personalities in evangelistic preaching.

Course Teaching Methodology

This course will involve students reading assigned books, preparing assigned reports,

participating in scholarly discussion, and writing papers associated with evangelistic preaching. The professor will guide students in this work.

Requirements

1. BIBLIOGRAPHY. Each student will prepare a short annotated bibliography of at least three (3) journal articles since 1995, and at least two (2) websites that address various facets of evangelistic preaching. Each entry should contain 3-5 sentences stating the thesis of the material and its significance for evangelistic preaching. **Due: August 31.**
2. SERMON BRIEF. Each student will develop a sermon brief of an *expository evangelistic sermon* from one of the four Gospels. The brief should follow the format of the sermon brief form attached to the syllabus. **Due: September 7.**
3. BOOK REVIEW. Each student will prepare a 3-5 page single-spaced book review on a selected book that deals with some aspect of evangelistic preaching. Each student will have 10 minutes to discuss the significant contributions of the book to the field of evangelistic preaching. **Due: September 14.**
4. MINOR PAPER. Each student will prepare a minor research paper on the philosophy and practice of a significant evangelistic preacher. The body of the paper should be at least 15 pages double-spaced in proper Turabian style. Choosing the subject for research will be the responsibility of the student in consultation with the professor. The student's presentation should last approximately 40 minutes including discussion from seminar participants. **Due: September 21, 28/October 5, 12.**
5. MAJOR PAPER. Each student will prepare a major research paper on an issue related to evangelistic preaching. The body of the research paper should be at least 25 pages double-spaced in proper Turabian style. Paper topics must be chosen by the student in consultation with the professor. The paper will be delivered to all seminar participants one week before the presentation date. **Due: October 26/November 2, 9, 16, 30/December 7.**

Course Evaluation

Although it should go without saying, students are expected to exercise the highest of ethics and integrity in keeping with the character of Christ when completing all assignments. The grading scale and attendance requirements will be according to those outlined in the current *Graduate Catalog*. The value of assignments will be as follows:
