### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This colloquium is designed to direct students majoring in evangelism in the Doctor of Philosophy program in foundational readings related generally to the field of discipleship, with concern for classical as well as contemporary methods, models, and authors. This colloquium is a resource-driven learning experience that involves the reading and discussion of selected texts. Ultimately, it serves as an opportunity to explore potential research projects and bibliography development for a dissertation.

### **STUDENT COURSE OBJECTIVES**

By the end of the semester the students should be able to:

1. *Intelligently dialogue* concerning a broad range of perspectives from classical to contemporary methods and models of discipleship.

2. *Value* reading and dialogue as a means of life-long learning.
3. *Expand* their developing literature review toward the Doctor of Philosophy oral exam and dissertation development.

## **COURSE REQUIREMENTS**

1. Students will attend all four colloquium meetings from 1:30-3:20 PM on Mondays: Aug. 20, Oct. 8, Nov. 5, and Dec. 3.
2. Students will read and report on eight books, preparing a three to five page double-spaced critique of each. Seven of the books are required. The other book will be the student's choice from the bibliography provided. Choices will be made during the first seminar meeting in order to insure there are no duplications.
3. Students will prepare an annotated bibliography of 15-20 additional significant and influential resources to be submitted December 3. Copies should be provided for all colloquium participants.
4. Students should be prepared to discuss the required books and to present the chosen book to the rest of the students. Copies of reviews *for personally selected texts* should be available for all colloquium participants.

## **GRADING SCALE**

This is a Pass/Fail course. Grading will be based upon text familiarity, dialogue participation and written work. The overall assessment of the work will be from a qualitative perspective.
