**Course Description**

In this seminar, books and readings are selected to challenge the student's thinking about the role of the client's spirituality in the counseling process, the formation and practice of personal spirituality as a component of the functional process of relating to clients, and to aid the student in the practice of Christian counseling that engages the spiritual dimension of both self and client.

**Program Objective #4: Research and Scholarship:** Be able to critically analyze and evaluate scholarly research, develop and implement research designs, and produce scholarly reports that disseminate findings to the profession of counseling.

### **Course Teaching Methodology**

The course will involve the following methodologies: reading assignments, written critiques and colloquium discussion.

The colloquium will meet from 7-9 PM on the following Fridays: 9/14, 10/12, 11/30. Students may attend the meeting in person in the assigned room on the NOBTS campus in New Orleans. Students may also choose to attend the meeting online via a synchronous video conferencing connection.

Attendance at the course meeting is required. Because of the nature of the course, no absences are allowed.

Students who plan to attend via video conferencing must notify the professor in advance of the course meeting. It is the student's responsibility to secure a high-speed, stable (preferably hard-wired) internet connection on a computer or other device capable of video conferencing or accessing the meeting through a web browser. Use of headphones or ear buds with a mic is preferred for sound quality. Be mindful of any streaming restrictions that may be imposed by your chosen internet provider.

### **Technical Resources and Competencies**

Students in the NOBTS Counseling Program are expected to have access to a home computer or laptop, Internet access, and basic Microsoft Office software (Word, PowerPoint, and Excel). Desktop computers are available for use by students in the Information Technology Center (ITC), 2<sup>nd</sup> floor, Hardin Student Center, New Orleans Campus. The online version of Microsoft Office is [available free](#) to enrolled NOBTS students through the seminary ITC. In addition, students should develop competencies in the following areas. These competencies are based on the Association for Counselor Education and Supervision (ACES) Technical Competencies.

1. Be able to use productivity software to develop group presentations, letters, and reports.
2. Be able to use such audiovisual equipment as video recorders, audio recorders, projection equipment, video conferencing equipment, and playback units.
3. Be able to use email.
4. Be able to help clients search for various types of counseling-related information via the internet, including information about careers, employment opportunities, educational & training opportunities, financial assistance/scholarships, treatment procedures, and social and personal information.
5. Be able to subscribe, participate in, and sign off counseling related listservs.
6. Be able to access and use counseling related CD-ROM and online databases.
7. Be knowledgeable of the legal and ethical codes which relate to counseling services via the Internet.
8. Be knowledgeable of the strengths and weaknesses of counseling services provided via the Internet.
9. Be able to use the Internet for finding and using continuing education opportunities in counseling.
10. Be able to evaluate the quality of Internet information.

These competencies meet or exceed the recommendations of both the American Counseling Association and the Council of Standards in Human Services Education.

### Evaluation of Grade

The professor will use a grading rubric to assign a grade of **Pass** or **Fail** based upon the completeness and excellence of critiques and contribution to discussions.
